Dear President Obama:

We write to you as leaders of faith and faith-based organizations, from across the United States and around the world, to express our deep concern about proposed flat funding for the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR). Flat or decreased funding will have a devastating impact on the strong US response to date to the global HIV and AIDS pandemic. Many people living with HIV world-wide will be denied life-saving antiretroviral therapy, succumbing to AIDS, dying prematurely, increasing resistance to existing antiretroviral drugs, and leaving more orphans.

US efforts to address HIV/AIDS must not be allowed to falter as the world seeks to achieve Universal Access in 2010 to HIV/AIDS prevention, care and treatment services, and a goal to which the United States has committed itself. We must also maintain the pace of funding in order to meet the reauthorized mandated U.S. global AIDS response through PEPFAR, including increasing the healthcare workforce by 140,000 new health professionals, strengthening health systems, and expanding services to 5 million orphaned and vulnerable children.

We welcome and support your call for the development of a new Global Health Initiative. We also acknowledge the need for increased funding for programs to address neglected tropical diseases and maternal and child health. However, we urge you to ensure funding for these new priorities does not come at the expense of the commitments and progress already made through the Tom Lantos and Henry J. Hyde United States Global Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Reauthorization Act of 2008.

America's global health programs have scored tremendous accomplishments in recent years. Bipartisan support in the Congress and White House leadership have led to tangible gains in saving lives in many impoverished countries across the globe. These programs have demonstrated to the world the great value the American people place on compassion and good neighborliness.

We are called, as people of faith and as a country, to console those who suffer, provide care for those that are sick and give solace and hope to the marginalized and outcast. Guided by our faith, we seek to walk with the people most affected and call on ourselves and leaders at all levels, to intensify efforts to care for the sick, provide treatment and increase prevention efforts for HIV, TB and malaria.

We cannot afford to lose momentum in the fight against these diseases. TB, for instance, is having a major impact on women. TB is the third leading cause of morbidity and mortality

combined in women of reproductive age in developing countries. Drug resistant strains of TB are already posing significant challenge to our efforts, and this will only worsen if TB programs fail to get the resources at the level envisioned under Hyde-Lantos.

Yet, the success of our HIV/AIDS programs is now threatened by a slow-down in the pace of funding. Concern is now rising in affected countries about the impact of a slowdown in US funding on HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment and care and support. Ambassador Eric Goosby, the US Global AIDS Coordinator, recently said that, “a flat or slightly rising PEPFAR allocation is what we are looking at for at least two years, maybe longer.” A report recently issued by Doctors Without Borders, called “Punishing Success”? Early Signs of a Retreat from Commitment to HIV/AIDS Care and Treatment,” documents the potential impact of a troubling slowdown and cutbacks of HIV and TB services.

While countries themselves must do more to maintain their own health programs, they must also be able to trust that the US will be a reliable partner. We believe it is deeply in the interest of the United States to fully fund the programs authorized under Hyde-Lantos, at the specified level, and we urge you to include this funding in your Global Health Initiative.

We stand ready to work with you to ensure these programs have maximum support. The commitment we seek is one that fully embraces all God's children who are infected and affected with the scourge of disease and poverty. Mr. President, we are counting on your leadership.
